Greetings

Our Füvészkert is a quarter-millennium years old, this is history itself. During this period it has witnessed and actively participated in the formation and development of the Hungarian botany. Many relocations occurred in its history – unwanted; however these relocations later proved to be advantageous. This special exhibition was created according to 20-year-long experience of Prague Botanical Garden with the cooperation of the international team of "Botanical Garden: COME IN! VSTUPTE! KOM IN! WEJDŹ! GYERE BE!" project funded by the European Union Erasmus+ program.

Its universal design aims to involve wide public, including visitors with special needs. The exhibition is unique because visitors can perceive the exhibits not only by sight, but they can enjoy it using all their senses. Exhibits can be touched, heard, smelt and sometimes even tasted. They are accompanied by labels and descriptions both in latin and Braille. Those who are interested can borrow an eye mask and a special audioguide.

The topic Symbiosis describes various and fascinating relationships between living organisms in nature with an entertaining and interactive approach.

95 YEARS OF BOTANICAL ILLUSTRATIONS



The exhibition of botanical illustrations as part of EUROGARD IX. European Botanic Gardens Congress in Budapest consists of three parts:

We show the reprints of 26 watercolours by **Vera CSAPODY**, Hungarian botanist and researcher of the Hungarian Natural History Museum. Her oeuvre of invaluable artistic and scientific value contains ca. 11.500 watercolours of both native and introduced plants of Hungary, an immense collection of illustrations that enrich the unique botanical documentation of HNHM. The selection of works for EuroGard concentrates on endemic species, which are involved into ex situ conservation programmes of several Hungarian Botanic Gardens and were painted between 1927-1977.

The 24 special black and white drawings from 1988 to 2018 represent the International Dendrological Foundation (Hungary). The artworks for the Dendrological Atlas project supported by I.D.R.I., Inc. (U.S.) were created by Nóra G. Nagy, Aili Li and Fanni Veronika Vámos based on botanical sketches by Zsolt Debreczy project leader.

The show of sensitively crafted botanical illustrations created by 17 artists of the Vienna School of Botanical Illustration are the youngest artworks of the exhibition. The association founded in 2017 has strong linkages with the Botanical Garden of the University of Vienna. Meanwhile, it has more than 100 members not only from Austria, but also from other European countries like Germany, Ireland or the Netherlands.

2. NATURAL VEGETATION SPOTS OF THE PANNONIAN FOREST STEPPE PRESERVED IN THE **SOROKSÁR BOTANICAL GARDEN** – GUIDED TOUR

The Pannonian Biogeographic region represents the easternmost edge of the Eurasian forest steppe zone. Rare steppe species, endemics and colourful orchids accompanied by tremendous number of Iris flowers provide an exceptional view when walking along the protected fen meadow, entering the oak groves accompanied by tartar maple or climbing up the inland sandy dune with mass of feather grasses.



3. SALINE STEPPES - FARMOS - GUIDED TOUR

The saline steppes, meadows and lakes on the Hungarian lowland harbour a special continental steppe flora. Species adapted to high salt content are located in the former low-lying river catchment of the Tisza River. The flora is limited by the harsh habitat conditions, which allow the development of a specific halophytic steppe vegetation.



National Botanical Garden Vácrátót

The 180-year-old romantic landscape-designed garden, also a national monument and nature conservation area, is the richest scientific plant collection of Hungary . The scenes of this 27 hectare park are engaging in all four seasons.
